

The regular meeting of the Greenville City Council was called to order by Mayor Snow, in the Council Chambers, in the Municipal Complex, located at 415 S. Lafayette Street, Greenville, MI 48838 at 7:30 p.m.

Present: Mayor Snow, Councilpersons Hoppough, Lehman, Cunliffe, Smith, Moss and Scoby; City Manager Bosanic; Assistant City Manager VanWyngarden; and Clerk-Treasurer Hool.

Absent: None.

Councilperson Moss MOVED: The Consent Agenda be approved as presented. Councilperson Lehman supported. Unanimously adopted.

The Consent Agenda consisted of the following:

1. Approval of minutes for the regular City Council meeting held May 18, 2010.
2. Approval of payroll report for pay period ending May 16, 10201, in the amount of \$132,487.78. Approval of accounts payable report for period ending May 25, 2010, in the amount of \$124,730.39.
3. Approval of minutes for the regular DDA meeting held April 13, 2010. Approval of minutes for the regular Planning Commission meeting held April 22, 2010.
4. Set a public hearing for June 15, 2010 at 7:30 p.m. to receive comment on the proposed 2010-2011 Fiscal Budget.

Council considered a request from the Greenville Area Chamber of Commerce to approve the closure of a portion of Greenville West Drive from 3:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. for the Six Annual Greenville Car Show, scheduled for Saturday, August 7<sup>th</sup>.

Councilperson Lehman MOVED: Council approves the request from the Greenville Area Chamber of Commerce to approve the closure of a portion of Greenville West Drive from 3:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. for the Sixth Annual Greenville Car Show scheduled for Saturday, August 7<sup>th</sup>, as presented. Councilperson Cunliffe supported. Unanimously adopted.

Council considered the approval of a resolution authorizing a Receiving Board for each election held in the year 2010.

Councilperson Moss RESOLVED: WHEREAS, Michigan Election Law states that the legislative body of a City may, by resolution, provide that one or more additional boards of election inspectors be appointed to serve as a Receiving Board at an election at which the ballots are counted and certified at the precinct; and

WHEREAS, not less than two election inspectors in a precinct, representing each of the major political parties, shall deliver to the Receiving Board for that precinct materials for canvassing in sealed containers, as required by Michigan Election Law; and

WHEREAS, the Receiving Board shall open the sealed containers and review the statement of votes to determine that the number of individuals voting recorded in the poll book equals the number of ballots issued to electors, as shown by the statement of votes; and

WHEREAS, the Election Commission shall appoint two election inspectors from differing major political parties as the Receiving Board; and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk as Chair of the City of Greenville Election Commission recommends that Receiving Boards be established for each election held in 2010;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: The Greenville City Council authorizes a Receiving Board for each election held in the year 2010. Councilperson Hoppough supported. Unanimously adopted.

Council considered the approval of a resolution accepting the State of Michigan's Green Communities Challenge.

Councilperson Moss RESOLVED: WHEREAS, the City of Greenville wants to emphasize the benefits of energy efficiency and conservation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Greenville wants to demonstrate that energy efficiency and conservation practices can be applied to the daily governmental operations and to infrastructure projects; and

WHEREAS, the City of Greenville seeks to find methods of service delivery and operations that conserve energy and resources, saving taxpayer dollars and protecting and preserving the environment; and

WHEREAS, the City of Greenville recognizes that sound energy efficiency and conservation practices can reduce government costs over the long-term; and


WHEREAS, the City of Greenville will lead by example to show the practicality and effectiveness of these practices; and
